Towns' Beginnings

On 27th September, 1839 the N.Z. Company bought town-land at Port Nicholson, and shortly afterwards made purchases of similar areas elsewhere-notably at Nelson, Wanganui and New Plymouth. Before this time, however, early traders had lived, intermittently, at these and other places-mostly on the coast and especially in North Auckland. It is therefore impossible to fix precise dates for the foundation of such settlements: and so the following dates refer really to the first organised attempts to form the towns:-

RATES OF POSTAGE FIRST-CLASS MAIL-MATTER

REGISTRATION.—By prepayment of a fee of dd. in addition to the full postage, any letter, letter-card, post-card, book or other packet, or newspaper may be registered to almost any place in the world. Parcels may be registered for delivery within the Dominion, but they cannot be registered beyond the Dominion; they may, however, be insured to most countries. The sender of a registered article may obtain an acknowledgment of its due delivery on payment of an additional fee of 3d. The maximum liability of the Postmaster-General for the loss of a registered letter is £2.

LETTERS CONTAINING COIN OR BANK-NOTES, OR JEWELLERY MUST BE REGIS-TERED. Fee 4d. If posted unregistered, such letters will be compulsorily registered and charged double the registration fee.

LETTERS AND LETTER-CARDS (ordinary) INLAND.—(including Cook Islands, Niue, and Western Samoa), 2d, first ounce; 1d, each additional joz. British countries, Egypt and Iraq, 2d, first joz.; 1d. each additional joz. Foreign countries (except Egypt and Iraq), 3d, first joz.; 1d. each additional joz. Letters posted partly or wholly unpaid are charged on delivery double the amount of the deficiency.

"LATE FEE" LETTERS.—2d, additional to postage.

AIR-MAIL LETTERS, Inland—3d. each ½oz. Great Britain and Ireland, and other countries, rates vary—inquire at Post Office.

PACKETS AND PARCELS (Inland) Size limit, 54in. length and girth combined (if registered add 4d.). Packets—Up to 6oz. (minimum) 3d.; up to 8oz., 4d.; up to 10oz., 5d.; up to 12oz., 6d.; up to 14oz., 7d. Parcels—Up to 3lb., 8d.; up to 7lb., 1/3; up to 14lb., 2/-; up to 21lb., 2/9; up to 28lb., 3/6.

EXPRESS TRANSIT SERVICE.—On payment by the sender of a special fee of 6d. in addition to the postage mentioned above, a parcel for delivery within New Zealand will be forwarded to its destination by the first ordinary lettermail despatched after the time of posting. On arrival at the office of destination such express parcel may be called for at the post office; otherwise it will be delivered in the ordinary course.

PARCEL INSURANCE FEES.—For delivery within New Zealand. Value £2—fee 4d.; £12—fee 6d.; £24—fee 8d.; £36—fee 10d.; £48—fee 1/-; £60—fee 1/2. For insurance of parcels over £60 (or for overseas), see Post Office.

For special rates on air-mail parcels, cinematograph-film parcels, and parcels that exceed in size ordinary parcel-post limits, inquire at Post Office.

Australian States, 8d. for the first 1lb., and 6d. for each succeeding 1lb. up to 11lb. maximum.

Great Britain, 2/- up to 3lb., 3/4 up to 7lb., 4/6 up to 11lb., 7/- up to 22lb.

POSTAL NOTE COMMISSION.—For postal notes from 1/- to 2/6, 2d.; 3/- to 7/6, 3d.; 8/- to 15/-, 4d.; 15/6 to £1, 5d.

Broken amounts may be made up by the use of postage stamps, not exceeding 5d. in value, affixed to the front of any one postal note. These stamps must be affixed only by the senders or remitters of such postal notes. When a postal note is presented for payment with the name of the payee inserted, payment will be made only to the signature of the person so named; or, if a note is already signed by the person named as the payee, it must be indorsed on the back by the presenter. If a postal note is crossed "and Co." payment will be made only through a bank; and if the name of a bank is added, payment will be made through that bank only. These notes are not payable out of New Zealand.

MONEY ORDERS—Inland. Ordinary: 7d. up to £10, and 3d. for each additional £5 up to

maximum for single order (£40).

By Telegraph: As for orders by post, plus a telegraph fee of 1/2, or if sent "Urgent," 1/10.

Beyond News Zealand mitt-dama

Australian States: 6d. for £2, 1/- for £5, 1/6 for £7, 2/- for £10, and so on.

All other places: Refer to Post Office.

The remitter of a Money Order Telegram may have a private communication for the payee added to the official telegram of advice on paying for the additional words at the rate of 1d. per word ordinary or urgent. The rate to Chatham Islands or to Fiji is 6d. per word.

SOLDIERS' POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK ACCOUNTS.—A Post Office Savings Bank account is opened by the Army Department on behalf of a soldier who does not otherwise allot the "compulsory" portion of his pay. Interest is credited to the account at the same rate per cent as in the case of an ordinary account. While in the Dominion, the soldier may operate upon the account at will and upon proceeding overseas may arrange through his Base Paymaster for the withdrawal of moneys not exceeding £30 (N.Z. currency) in any one calendar year.

COLLECT TELEGRAMS.—In respect of collect telegrams an extra charge of 3d. (known as "collect fee") is added to the ordinary rate and is collected from the addressee.

LETTER TELEGRAMS.—Up to twenty-four words, 1s. 2d.; each additional two words, 1d.

(Letter Telegrams are delivered by the first ordinary post following the day of lodgement. They are not accepted on Sundays and departmental holidays.)
